This labyrinth at St. Augustine's is part of our church's mission to be a community of worship, prayer and service, welcoming all with love and acceptance. Walking the labyrinth is a sacred ritual that emerged about 3500 years ago on four continents and today is found in many religious traditions around the world. In addition to being a sacred journey of faith, labyrinths today are being used in hospitals, retirement centers, and prisons as a spiritual practice of healing and transformation.

Our labyrinth has changed over time. The first version was built in 2009 as a joint project by members of the church and a volunteer youth group from All Saints Episcopal Church in Omaha, Nebraska. Local beach rocks were arranged in an 8 circuit, left-handed design, a modification of the great French medieval labyrinth in Chartres Cathedral. It was redesigned in 2015 by HoWL, a Homer youth leadership group, and church volunteers. The six path design had paths wide enough to

accommodate wheelchairs. It was re-done again in 2017, moving it several feet to the east so it wouldn't encroach on the western property line. In 2019 we modified and upgraded the design again to eliminate potential hazards, especially tripping. Wood chips and beach rocks were replaced with gravel, brick and marble chips to make a completely flat surface. The entire labyrinth was scaled back in size to approximately 40' in width, and the layout was simplified to 5 circuits.

We also have an indoor labyrinth which was designed and created for us by Nell Gustafson in 2017. It's made of painter's drop cloth/canvas and blue painter's tape. It is used in the sanctuary on Saturdays in Advent and Lent after Noonday Prayers or Compline when we are unable to use the outside labyrinth.

Here are some points to consider when walking the labyrinth.

Simply follow the path to the center. Here are some suggestions as you begin:

At the entrance, quiet your mind.

Set your intention. Ask yourself - Why have I come? What do I hope will happen for me? Begin to walk. Return to your intention if you find your mind wandering. Pause at the center. Have you received any insights? Linger and give thanks.

As you walk out, acknowledge any insights and listen for ways to integrate them into your life. Pause as you leave the labyrinth and be thankful.

St. Augustine's has dedicated its Labyrinth and Sacred Garden as places for prayer that transcends denominations, creeds, doctrine, culture, language, gender identity, or sexual orientation. All are

welcome to our handicap accessible labyrinth during daylight hours. May it be for you:


Deacon Jake...mopping




